

The Story of Annie Belle Driggers-Gilliam

Annie Belle Gilliam was born May 19, 1921 and passed away on November 4, 2018 at the age of 97. She was born in South Carolina and was the youngest of eight children. Her parents Dixie and Mattie Driggers moved to Sorrento when Belle was 2 years old. Some of her family drove in a Model-T Ford and others road the train in boxcars accompanying their mule and other farm animals as they were bound for a new life in Florida. Four days later they arrived in Sorrento on Thanksgiving Day.

At the age of 6 Belle was enrolled in the Sorrento School. Whooping cough was in the family and Belle came down with red measles causing her to became legally blind for awhile, which delayed her high school graduation for 2 years.

After completing four grades in Sorrento her family moved to Apopka and in 1941 she graduated from Apopka High School. Her first job was working at the Economy Store while she also worked for her parents at their store, the Dixie Service Station.

On May 16, 1946 she married Garrett Gilliam and they had 1 daughter Beverly and 1 son Garrett. They bought Garrett's family business and ran it until his death in 1975. They were married for 29 years. Belle continued running their business until after the freeze of 1983 and 1985.

Belle volunteered and supported her community in any way she could. She was a charter member of the Apopka Historical Society, served on the Board for 50 years as President, Vice President, Librarian and Curator, doing research, maintaining scrapbooks and participating as a Docent.



One of the biggest honors in her life was when Mayor John H. Land of Apopka presented Belle with a Proclamation stating;

WHEREAS, On May 22, 2011, an Open House will be held at the Museum of the Apopkans from 1:00 p.m., to 4:00 p.m., to honor Belle on her 90th Birthday and to show our appreciation for all she has done for our community.

NOW, THEREFORE, I John H. Land, Mayor of the City of Apopka, Florida, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the City of Apopka, do proclaim May 22, 2011 as

"Annie Belle Gilliam Day"

in the City of Apopka and recognize a true servant and friend of the people of the Apopka Community.

Another honor she received the same day was from the Office of the Orange County Mayor

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the citizens of Orange County and the Orange County Mayor to honor Annie Belle Driggers-Gilliam on the occasion of her 90th birthday.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Teresa Jacobs, by virtue of the authority vested in me as Orange County Mayor, do here by proclaim Sunday, May 22, 2011 as

Annie Belle Driggers-Gilliam Appreciation Day

In Orange County, Florida, in celebration of the life of Annie Belle Driggers-Gilliam and in recognition of her 90th birthday.

In 1886 prosperity was at its height, with a train bringing in passengers and supplies. There was a packing house, a drugstore and even a newspaper, the Highland Press with Phillip Isaacs as editor. Sorrento was a busy little village. Thanksgiving meant a community dinner at the Town Hall and Christmas was celebrated at the church with a great Christmas tree, a program of music and recitations and presents for everybody. Santa Claus never failed to appear and he never overlooked anybody when he distributed the gifts.

The hour was late when the festivities were over and the calls of "Merry Christmas" were heard as in wagons, buckboards or walking, the happy friendly people returned to their homes in the village or in their groves among the pine woods.

As related by Miss Hattie Allen, who came to Sorrento I can still see in memory the twinkling lanterns moving off in all directions and hear the children saying, "There go the Allens", or "That must be the Registers" and "The Emersons are just starting up the hill."
